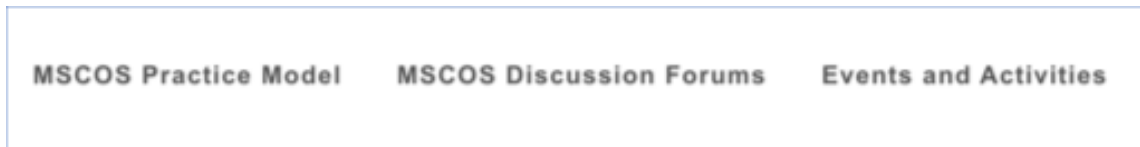

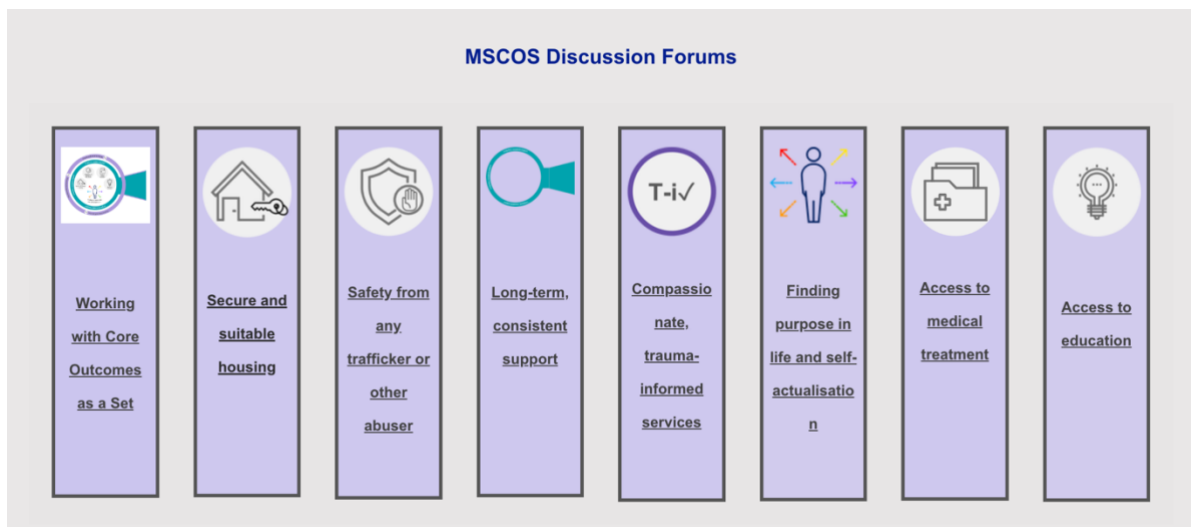

Secure & suitable housing

- Suggestion that an [independent monitoring body](#) should [inspect all forms of housing](#) provided to survivors of trafficking

Access to medical treatment
